OCEANIC APPOINTS SECOR TO STUDY POTENTIAL ECONOMIC BENEFITS TO NUNAVIK AND THE PROVINCE OF QUEBEC

Vancouver, BC, May 31, 2011 - Oceanic Iron Ore Corp. (the "Company") is pleased to announce that it has engaged SECOR, an international strategic consulting firm to produce a high level economic impact study to be used as the basis for its continuing discussions with the Quebec government in relation to the potential economic benefits of the development of the Ungava Bay Project under the Plan Nord. This initial study lays the foundation for further analysis as the Project develops, focusing on job creation, fiscal revenues, infrastructure development and potential economic and structural benefits for the local communities in the region.

SECOR's approach and methodology in respect of such economic analysis is well known across the mining industry and government, and they have in the past prepared a number of similar studies for major mining companies with operations in Quebec.
